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## Small steps to save lives

When Melton PT gym manager Sarah Lock's 10-year-old son, Tyler, found himself in a tricky situation, she realised how important a child can be in an emergency.

Tyler's friend had fallen off play equipment and broke his wrist.

Sarah said Tyler snapped into action. grabbed an adult and ran to his mum. 'There was no stuffing around. It

really showed that in a crisis kids can be really productive," she said.

Sarah was inspired by Tyler's actions and came across Cool Kids First Aid, a company that delivers first aid training to children as young as three.

Participants must aged between five to 13 and can expect to learn basic first aid, basic CPR, how to recognise an emergency situation and how and when to call triple-0. Sarah said the classes will be held at the guym and run for about two hours, but that "those two hours can make such a huge difference in tricky situations".



## **Powerline consultation**

Landowners likely to be impacted by the controversial Western Transmission Network Project have been given a chance to raise their concerns with the Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning (DELWP).

Moorabool council hosted a video conference with residents and the department on Thursday night, during which DELWP senior impact assessor Jack Krohn spoke about the project's Environment Effects Statement (EES), which is a key step in decision making for the power line project.

The EES process aims to allow decision makers to make informed conclusions about whether a project should proceed considering its environmental effects.

190-kilometre transmission line above ground, stretching from Bulgana near Stawell through Moorabool and Melton to Sydenham.

Mr Krohn said the department was investigating alternative measures for the project. As reported by Star Weekly, AusNet's proposal has been met with anger in the community, with residents, council and local MPs calling for the powerlines to be placed underground.

"Undergrounding is identified as one of the possible alternatives that might deliver an environmentally superior outcome for this project," Mr Krohn said.

Mr Krohn said the EES report will also include an assessment of potential impacts to the environment in the future, such as transmission towers starting or worsening

During the session, residents raised concerns for the "abundant" wildlife and forest areas which would be greatly impacted by the network.

Mr Krohn said he couldn't comment on what specific measures may be taken for particular areas or species, but that the department will include a specific investigation in its report. "There's a system for dealing with mitigation

and dealing with the sorts of impacts that may be identified. But at those very specific levels, it'll be in the final package," he said.

Earlier this week, AusNet released new guidelines for landholders, addressing issues like land access, compensations and easements.

Executive project director Stephanie McGregor said the compensation will be calculated and assessed on a case-by-case basis understanding renewable energy zones.



developed these comprehensive guidelines as quickly as possible, ahead of the proposed route being determined," Ms McGregor said. AusNet stated the compensation will

A study done by AusNet into the use of land and machinery height limits under the proposed transmission line confirmed that farming, including irrigated horticulture, can safely continue.

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## **Frustration over asbestos plan**

Ravenhall is an 'inappropriate' location to dump asbestos-riddled waste, according to Melton council.

The council has expressed its frustration at Cleanaway's plan to receive and dispose of asbestos waste at the Melbourne Regional Landfill in Ravenhall.

As reported by Star Weekly, Cleanaway is seeking approval from the Environment Protection Authority (EPA) to amend its licence in order to handle asbestos waste.

Melton mayor Goran Kesic said council had only recently been made aware of the proposal. Cr Kesic said Ravenhall is an area where families live and work and is not an appropriate location to dump toxic materials.

Cleanaway has a responsibility to ensure they clearly communicate these plans to the community, and provide ample opportunity for feedback. Cleanaway must directly and clearly articulate that this is a proposal to accept and process asbestos at their Ravenhall facility.'

Cr Kesic said all decision-making power lies with EPA and not with council.

"It is critically important that the

EPA thoroughly scrutinises the safety of Cleanaway's plans for possible transportation and treatment of asbestos," he said.

Cleanaway said in a statement the application will support the 'Asbestos Disposal Management Plan' from the state government, which stated that asbestos disposal facilities within Victoria are limited, with 27 locations across the state accepting asbestos waste.

"Our application to the EPA for a licence amendment requires a detailed asbestos management plan to ensure our compliance procedures for managing asbestos waste will be robust and safe for our staff, local community, and the environment," the statement said.

In its statement, Cleanaway said measures will be taken to minimise environmental and safety impacts, including being operated and monitored by trained professionals, GPS coordinates of where asbestos is located and monthly air monitoring around the perimeter of the asbestos disposal area.

Cleanaway will host several community information webinars in the next few weeks to inform the community of its plans.



## **Melton ambulance times worsen**

Ambulance response times in Melton have continued to worsen as the COVID-19 pandemic continues to cause delays in the area.

The latest performance data from Ambulance Victoria for the three months to September reveals the entire health system is under "significant pressure and increasing demand".

According to the data, paramedics responded to 2275 code one calls compared to 2265 in the three months to June.

Code one refers to calls which involve incidents that require urgent paramedic and hospital care, based on information received during the call, according to Ambulance Victoria.

The average response time in the September quarter increased to 15 minutes and 24 seconds, compared to fifteen minutes in the June quarter.

In the three months to September 2020, the average response time was 11 minutes and 35 seconds, however records show there 1800 calls were responded to.

Ambulance Victoria said in a statement the increase in response times is due to significant growth in Melton.

Ambulance Victoria chief executive Tony Walker said this quarter's performance data was not surprising given the level of demand being experienced across the state as the pandemic continues.

"The entire healthcare system across Australia is under sustained pressure and our paramedics and first responders are experiencing this first-hand," Professor Walker said.

"Along with increasing numbers of COVID-19 positive patients, demand has quickly rebounded to levels prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, despite the lockdowns.

"Performance has also been impacted by time spent at busy hospitals transferring patients, wearing PPE to all cases and people who have delayed visiting their GP or specialist during lockdown now finding themselves more unwell and needing urgent care."

In Moorabool, 52.4 per cent of code one calls were responded to in 15 minutes, up from 49.8 per cent in June.

However the average time has increased to 17 minutes and six seconds, up from 16 minutes and 45 seconds in the June quarter. Paramedics responded to 441 calls in

Moorabool in the September quarter, slightly less than the 456 calls in the June quarter. In September 2020, paramedics responded

to 383 calls in Moorabool, with the average response time 13 minutes and 31 seconds.

Professor Walker said Victorians are being urged to save triple-0 calls for emergencies only and to see their GP or pharmacist early for advice or treatment.

Meanwhile, the state government has committed to investing \$40 million that will boost capacity to transport suspected and confirmed COVID-19 patients and patients with less serious conditions.

"This funding package addresses the challenges we have today related to performance, to workload and demand with more paramedics, additional non-emergency patient transport vehicles and more support to improve patient flow at emergency departments," Professor Walker said.

The boost to non-emergency transport services will ensure patients get the right care at the right time, and that emergency ambulances are available for those needing time critical care.

"We suspect we will be facing these challenges due to COVID-19 until at least the end of the year and early into 2022."

Tree prices range between \$55 and \$75 depending on size and funds raised will go towards the Scout centre's yard.

Event organiser Sarah Prentice said the area is "a bit bare" at the moment.

"To make it sun smart and accessible for all-abilities we are fundraising for an outdoor area with shading, decking and fire pit plus equipment and activities."

The centre was closed during lockdowns, with Scouts meeting via zoom for weekly programs.

With restrictions eased, the group have returned to face-to-face activities this week and are "very excited" to be back.

'The youth just want to get back together and have fun," Ms Prentice said.

Next year, the Scouts are looking forward to camping the most, with an upcoming event in

December to kick off the year.

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

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## **New Diggers Rest park approved**

Residents in Diggers Rest and surrounding areas can expect a new local park in the coming months.

Melton council recently approved plans for the one hectare park, named Flore Community Park, which will support the growing demand for green space in the community following ongoing lockdowns.

The park, in the Bloomdale estate, will be built by AVID Property Group, with work starting this month.

The project will add to the existing seven hectares of green space at Bloomdale and

will feature multiple barbeque and recreation spaces, multi-age play equipment, wide, open grass areas with pockets for nature and sensory play.

Flore Community park will also include multiple walkways for residents and visitors to incorporate into daily exercise routines.

AVID victorian general manger Peter Vlitas said the company found the overwhelming response for a park was driven by the needs of the local community, with information drawn from focus group sessions.

"Throughout 2020 we engaged with members of the Bloomdale community to seek their feedback on what they would like to see in their local parks, both now and into the future," Mr Vlitas said.

"Overwhelmingly, residents said they wanted the park to offer an experience, which is why we have incorporated various pockets of both active and passive spaces for people to explore throughout the new park.

"We are thrilled to mark this exciting milestone and look forward to meeting the health and wellbeing needs of our local community with the new Flore Community Park."

CDA Design Group associate landscape architect Ninka Cook worked with AVID to develop the design of the park and said the community feedback was invaluable in creating a custom space for Diggers Rest.

"Throughout the pandemic we have seen people confined to their immediate surroundings for extended periods of time. The feedback has emphasised the need and want for the community to get outside and enjoy nature," Ms Cook said.

The park is projected to be completed in April 2022.

For Manuel Sison, art became his way of coping with anxiety and depression.

After a tough break-up a couple of years ago, Sison, who was a graphic designer, decided to turn to art to help him deal with his emotions. Since then art has continued to help him

through the tough times. "I used art to process after the break up," he

said. "It has definitely really been a good outlet. It has been good to deal with the pressures and negative emotions."

The Brimbank resident is part of a new exhibition that is being run by the North Western Melbourne Primary Health Network (NWMPHN).

Artists with lived experience of mental health challenges have been commissioned to produce stunning works for a new "art bombing" campaign around Brimbank and Melton to draw attention to the reality of suicide and suicidal thinking.

The aim it to change perceptions around this difficult but critically important subject by exploring skilled and deeply personal explorations of trauma and recovery.

Sison was forwarded the project through a former boss and thought it was a good opportunity to make more meaningful art for a good cause.

He has created six pieces for the project, colourful and thought-provoking 3D illustrations that reflect on his own experiences with mental health challenges.

The leader of NWMPHN's suicide prevention team, Jackie Ceratti, said Sison and his fellow artists provided vital insight into a very challenging and complex area of health and welfare.

## New children's centre under way for Mt Atkinson

Melton council has appointed a contractor to begin developing a new children's and community centre in Mt Atkinson.

The Mt Atkinson Children's and Community Centre is projected to cost \$7.5 million and will provide space for three-andfour-year-old kindergarten and maternal and child health services.

The centre will also provide space for community meetings and activities.

Mayor Goran Kesic said the facility would be a welcome addition for the Mt Atkinson community.

"This centre will help meet the needs of the rapidly growing Mt Atkinson and Tarneit Plains community which is set to grow to more than 30,000 people," Cr Kesic said.

The project is in partnership with the Victorian government whoich is helping

to fund the centre with \$2 million from the state's Building Blocks grants and \$800,000 from the Growing Suburbs Fund.

Council has committed \$4.7 million to the project.

"It will provide a welcoming place for children to attend kindergarten, for families to access maternal and child health services, and for community groups to gather," Cr Kesic said.

"It's a key part of a well-planned hub of activity with a future primary school and a recreation reserve planned nearby.

"I look forward to seeing the community enjoy and make the most of this important facility.'

Construction is scheduled to be complete by August 2022.

## **Talking to help prevent scams**

Melton and Moorabool residents are being urged to protect themselves and their families from financial scams as part of a new Crime Stoppers Victoria campaign.

The 'Let's Talk Scams' campaign was launched as part of national Scams Awareness Week, which run until Friday, November 12.

The campaign is designed to prevent the public from falling victim to financial scams, also known as investment scams.

These scams promise victims big payouts, fast money or guaranteed returns only to trick them into handing over their money.

Financial scams have cost Australians \$114

million just this year of which Victorian losses represent \$30 million.

It's predicted that by the end of 2021, losses to financial scams Australia-wide will have more than doubled last year's figure.

People aged over 65 are most likely to fall victim to financial scams.

Crime Stoppers Victoria chief executive Stella Smith said: "Scammers will target older people because they are less likely to tell anyone. That's why talking with your parents and grandparents is an important step in scam prevention.

"We don't want people to feel embarrassed about being scammed. Talking about scams helps raise awareness among friends and family – it's about shaming the scammer, not the victim."

Chinese, Vietnamese, Burmese, and Sri Lankan communities have also been disproportionately affected with scammers going after people whose English is their second language, Crime Stoppers said.

Scammers use a series of methods to target victims, including unsolicited phone calls, text messages, emails and social media messages Eiengial scame are often disquired within

Financial scams are often disguised within financial trends like cryptocurrency, celebrity endorsements and superannuation.

Chief information officer at BankVic, Scott Wall, said it was important potential investors do their own research and consider seeking professional advice before handing over any money.

"The idea that you can make a lot of money with very little risk seems extremely appealing.

"But people need to remember, if an investment opportunity or offer seems too good to be true, it probably is."

Crime Stoppers Victoria has teamed up with Victoria Police and BankVic to produce a podcast titled 'Let's Talk Scams' to raise awareness and give information about scams.

Residents are urged to contact their bank immediately and make a report to Scamwatch at scamwatch.gov.au if they have been scammed or suspect they may have been targeted by scammers.

#### Teens charged with armed robberies

Four teens have been arrested over a series of alleged armed robberies and aggravated home invasions.

Police said a 16-year-old Brookfield boy was facing a number of charges including aggravated burglary, theft of a motor vehicle, handling stolen goods, armed robbery and committing an indictable offence while on bail.

He was remanded in custody to face court on November 11.

A 15-year-old Kurunjang boy was charged with robbery, intentionally causing injury, theft of a motor vehicle, affray and committing an indictable offence while on bail, police said.

In a statement, police said an application had been made to have the boy remanded in custody.

A 16-year-old boy from Brookfield was charged with a number of offences, including two counts of armed robbery, affray, indictable assault police and committing an indictable offence while on bail. Police said they also made an application to have remanded in custody.

A 19-year-old man from Melton was charged with robbery, affray, unlawful assault, theft, criminal damage and assault with a weapon. Police have made an application to have him remanded in custody.

## New opportunities for young people to safely connect

VicHealth will partner with organisations across the state to deliver more than 100,000 new opportunities for young people to socially and safely connect in the next two years.

The Big Connect – the first investment of VicHealth's ground-breaking Future Healthy initiative – will support the mental wellbeing of young people, by creating opportunities for them to reconnect with their friends, families and communities in ways that work for them.

A range of Victorian organisations will have the opportunity to partner with VicHealth, including those from from sports, active recreation, arts, cultural, youth, health promotion and community food sectors.

The new investment comes as a VicHealth survey revealed more than one in three young people in Victoria feel like they don't fit in with their local community or neighbourhood.

The survey also found that among Victoria's 18-to-25-year-olds, four in five haven't been able to spend as much time with friends as they would like during the pandemic, while a similar number of those surveyed recognised that being socially connected is important for their mental wellbeing. The survey also found the majority of parents were concerned about the pandemic's impact on their child's ability to connect with friends and said opportunities to socially connect with others in their local neighbourhood had an impact on their child enjoying good health.

VicHealth chief executive Sandro Demaio said The Big Connect will fund inclusive projects that are co-designed with young people and families right across Victoria, in response to what they want and need.

"Our survey shows that young people want and need more spaces where they can

feel a sense of belonging and connection with others, particularly as we emerge from coronavirus restrictions," Dr Demaio said.

"Young people, parents and carers know that connecting meaningfully with others is important for good health, and there's plenty of evidence to support this. Research shows that building and maintaining meaningful social connections helps children, young people and their families boost their mental wellbeing, while reducing their likelihood of developing longer term ill-health."

## **Call for growth areas minister**

The National Growth Areas Alliance (NGAA) has revealed its key election priorities ahead of the next federal election.

The priorities aim to close the growing infrastructure gap many outer metropolitan areas face, including Melton.

According to new research, the underestimation of potential population in growth areas has created mounting economic, mental health and infrastructure issues in Australia's fastest growing communities.

The NGAA commissioned over 80,000 interviews with outer suburban residents. NGAA chief executive Bronwen Clark

said those interviews painted a picture of communities consistently overlooked by the

#### government.

"Our outer suburbs are home to the most essential workers and faced the strictest lockdowns. These are the communities that saw us through the pandemic and to date governments have failed to understand their needs," she said.

"Now, governments must join the dots between high COVID rates, high outbreak risk factors and the lag in social infrastructure in fast growing outer suburbs."

Ms Clark said the government should start with appointing a dedicated minister for growth areas which would help deliver infrastructure, jobs and housing to outer suburban communities.

The research found that following the pandemic, one in five (or 21 per cent) outer

suburbs residents reported that they are living in 'financial survival mode'.

More than half of residents are struggling to pay at least one bill, particularly energy, groceries, rent and personal loans, of which 64 per cent are under 40.

Ms Clark said to address the financial stress, there should be greater access to local jobs.

The research found residents were more likely to feel stressed, frustrated and anxious than the national average.

Ms Clark said revitalising job opportunities may also help alleviate the looming problem of mental health issues in growth areas.

Less than half of the growth area residents accessed mental health support in the last 12 months.

"This is fuelled by a lack of mental health

services, with caseloads of some growth area providers being twice the national average," Ms Clark said.

Ms Clark said soaring house prices and a record rise in land sales in recent years has been due to Australians "flocking to the outer suburbs to live the Australian dream of home ownership".

"Growth areas are home to vibrant communities that are growing twice as fast as the rest of the country.

"COVID-19 has shown that Australia's economic prosperity depends heavily on our vast growth areas workforce," Ms Clark said.

"It's now critical that a Minister for Growth Areas be appointed to lead an urgent national response to growth area inequities and COVID-19 recovery."

## Sod turned on new Catholic campus

A groundbreaking ceremony was held last week at the site of a new campus for Catholic Regional College Melton in Cobblebank.

Expected to open in 2023 for a smaller number of students, the campus is expected to eventually cater for 1500 year seven to 12 students and be completed by 2028.

First stages of the project will begin in January 2022 and cost an initial \$23 million, with the 7.1 hectare site expected to be ready for 150 year seven students in 2023.

Melton MP Steve McGhie attended the

groundbreaking ceremony, with principal Marlene Jorgensen who said the school would offer new facilities and educational opportunities for the growing population in Melbourne's north-west corridor.

"Continued population growth has put considerable pressure on enrolments at the college," Mrs Jorgensen said.

"The exciting development of Cobblebank campus will see our established wellbeing and learning structures offered in a new contemporary educational space.

"We are thrilled to offer our programs to the growing community in Melton South and nurture graduates who are successful lifelong learners, confident and creative individuals and active, informed citizens."

Designed by Baldasso Cortese architects, the \$66 million college will be built in three stages over the next seven years.

#### **High COVID** cases in **Melton**

Melton is currently in the top 10 local government areas with the most COVID cases, despite high vaccination rates.

There are 863 active cases in the area as of Sunday.

It comes as a pop-up testing site in Ballan was opened last week to accommodate increased demand.

Neighbouring areas Brimbank, Hume, Wyndham and Whittlesea are also at the top of the list.

As of Monday, 86.8 per cent of Melton residents have received two doses and more than 95 per cent have had one jab.

The state government announced today \$2.5 million for community programs that remove practical barriers to vaccination and support increased vaccine uptake.

The program assists Victorians from vulnerable groups, such as people living with disability, young people, seniors, multicultural communities, social housing residents and victim survivors of family violence.

Multicultural Affairs and Youth Minister Ros Spence said the funding "will help overcome the barriers some Victorians face to getting vaccinated."

Victoria is now at 87.3 per cent fully vaccinated, meaning the state is well on its way to reaching 90 per cent.

Once that target is met, predicted to be on or before 24 November, many restrictions will be eased for Victorians, including no caps at certain venues, masks only in high risk settings and major events allowed.

## **Record parcel deliveries**

The Sunshine West Parcel Delivery Centre has processed nearly 27 million parcels in its first year of operation.

The centre celebrates its first anniversary milestone this month, after a year like no other. With a record number of parcels processed, restrictions and staff having to quarantine, it has been non-stop for the centre.

The 28,500 square metre site is capable of processing more than 100,000 parcels a day and is the biggest in the state.

There are more than 200-plus parcel delivery vans operating out of the site, delivering an average of 50,000 parcels per day across more than 48 postcodes in Melbourne's west.

Of the parcels processed in the past year, one million of them have been processed manually.

There are about 1000 team members, many of them Brimbank residents, working at the facility across processing, parcel delivery, van services, transport and support teams.

Centre processing manager Katrina Eishold said he been an incredibly challenging 12 months.

"The last 12 months have been some of the busiest and most challenging for Australia Post – and particularly for our team here at Sunshine West," she said.

"I couldn't be prouder of our team and the way they've worked together to process record numbers of parcels and deliver for our customers in Melbourne's west."

There will be no letting up for staff, with the Christmas period getting under way.

Australia Post business and government executive general manager Gary Starr said preparations for the peak season were already well under way, including recruiting a record more than 4000 Christmas casual team members.

"We're seeing record parcel volumes with more than 5.9 million households shopping online a month – that's more than half of all Australian households, and it's showing no signs of slowing as we head into the online sales season and Christmas," Mr Starr said.

## Animal neglect still a concern

Neglect continues to be the biggest animal welfare issue across Victoria, including in Melton according to recent RSPCA Victoria data.

RSPCA Victoria has reported that Melton had the seventh highest number of reports of welfare concerns for animals in the state, with 320 reports lodged in the 2020-21 year. This is a decrease from 2019-20, where 338 reports were lodged.

RSPCA Victoria's chief inspector Michael Stagg said the relationship between the COVID-19 pandemic and reports of mistreatment of animals was "really concerning".

"The correlation between lockdowns and an increase in reports of animal beating and wounding is a really concerning trend," Mr Stagg said. "COVID has created a significant

amount of pressure on people.

"When there is financial stress, mental health or drug and alcohol issues, animal cruelty and neglect tends to increase.

"It is also possible that reports have increased due to people being at home for longer periods."

Mr Stagg said it was important for people who were considering adopting a pet – or who had done so over the COVID-19 period – to do their homework before taking on the responsibility.

"With the high number of people adopting or taking on pets during COVID, it's vital that people understand how to look after their pet and what good welfare looks like," he said.

"Research what your pet needs in terms of food, shelter, grooming, exercise, training, vet care and companionship and if you're not sure, give us a call. We always prefer to help prevent welfare issues, than be called up when it's too late."

## United's ready and raring to go

After the "longest pre-season in the world" Western United will take to the pitch at Geelong's GMHBA Stadium this Saturday to kick start the 2021-22 A-League season. Tara Murray spoke with new coach John Aloisi and player Connor Pain ahead of the big match against Melbourne Victory.

fter another off-season full of lockdowns and restrictions, Western United's Connor Pain can't wait to take to the field this weekend.

Pain and his teammates will kick off their A-League season against Melbourne Victory.

Pain admits that the off-season was just as much a mental battle as one of trying to stay in shape and ready for the season.

"It's probably been the longest pre-season in the world," he said.

"The season creeping up now it's obviously exciting to get everything started.

"Aside from friendlies and stuff, it would have been four to five months, it felt like a long time.

"The training is great and all that, but we play for a reason and we can't wait to get back into competitive games."

For Pain, who is one of the club's original players, this pre-season has been slightly different.

With a new coach in John Aloisi and a number of new players, there has been plenty of excitement on the track.

It's the first time Pain has worked with Aloisi. "It has been great, it has been obviously intense, good to have some new ideas around the place and some new faces, not just in the coaching department," Pain said.

"It has been an interesting change, but it has been good so far and we're just looking to implement what we are working on.

"It's been really good and really positive. There are obviously really high standards in the camp and I can't say a bad word about him so far."

Pain said the group could see some of the magic that the new international players could produce.

He said they had all integrated seamlessly.

"It has been an odd one with COVID and getting all the foreigners here, [I] only really met a couple of them in the last week or two," he said.

"All of them in their own way have shown something. It's a good mixture and range of positions and they're only going to add to the good group of Aussies we have."

Pain isn't the only one itching for the season to begin, with Aloisi keen to get his United coaching career under way.

The former Australian star said he didn't realise how much he missed coaching until he hit the training track.

"You realise how much you miss it when you get back in," he said.

"Finally back on the grass again, I have really enjoyed it. It gives you that energy again. "When you miss it, you reflect on things. The

energy is there which is good from my part, excited to be back on the pitch."

Aloisi said he had been impressed by the whole playing group and how they had attacked the pre-season.

It hadn't been an easy one, with some players saying it was the hardest pre-season they had been through, he said.

"The boys have really taken on board what we are trying to do as a team and club," he said.

"They've been working really hard, which is the most important thing. The buy-in of the players has been exceptional, as a coach it makes your job so much easier and it actually helps the younger players get back to the level.

"Everyone in general has been working really well from the younger players to the older players. They've all worked really hard, and we've trained hard and for a lot of them it's the hardest pre-season.

"They've done the most important thing I look at, everyone has different talents but in terms of work ethic you look for, all of the players have shown they are willing to work and work for each other, that helps the team bond as well."

While Aloisi had been impressed with the whole squad, he said players such as Dylan

Pierias and Lachlan Wales had really benefited from being in the Australian Olympic team Three other players have just returned from

- the Olyroos Asian Cup qualifiers. He said Josh Risdon would also be like a new
- recruit after an injury-riddled season last year. Aloisi said the club was still doing some last

Aloisi said the club was still doing some last minute preparations as it looked to fire come the start of the season.

He said the imports were starting to find their feet after hotel quarantine had an early impact. "They're a little bit off fitness-wise especially

when you're stuck in hotel quarantine for two weeks," he said.

"They'll take a bit of time, we'll look after them. They've had a lot of hard pre-seasons in the past and have a good base, hopefully they'll be right for round one."

Aloisi said while there will be plenty of familiar faces on the pitch this season, fans can expect a different style on the pitch.

United will start their season with six matches in Melbourne, which is a bonus for the club and fans, who will be able to return to the stands.

Aloisi said the first six rounds would be exciting for the side.

"We've got confidence with the team we've got and the structure we've got," he said.

"It's exciting for the playing group and the public to see live sport again." Pain said he can't wait to see the fans back in

the stands.

"It's a strange thing to say football without fans..."

"We know we have the quality to get up there, the first thing is to crack finals and see what happens after that."

## Set your compass on new Jeep

The new Compass is out to point the way for Jeep to gain ground in the small sports utility vehicle segment, one of the most competitive markets in the automotive world.

The legendary US four-wheel drive maker, famous for its Rubicon test regimen on the infamous eponymous trail, a 22-mile route, part road and part hellish 4x4 track, in the Sierra Nevada of the western United States, which all genuine off-road Jeeps have to endure during development, has imbued the MY22 Compass with the finer things in SUV life.

As Tom Noble, marketing and communications manager, Jeep Australia puts it, since its launch in 2017, the Compass has been renowned for its off-road capability, now we're pairing that with advanced technology and premium interior styling.

The updated range kicks off with the Compass Launch Edition 2.4-litre petrol, six-speed automatic, front-wheel drive, with a focus on technology, safety and convenience in an affordable package - \$37,950, plus on-road costs.

The Compass Limited ups the ante with nine-speed auto and four-wheel drive, for \$43,950, followed by the 80th Anniversary (\$47,941), Compass S-Limited (\$46,950) and the Trailhawk 2.0-litre turbodiesel (\$51,250). On test was the Compass S-Limited.

#### Styling

Although classified in the lightweight (compact) division, on first glance the Compass could well tip the scales into the middleweight class, such is the muscled body.

The wagon maintains the traditional Jeep upright stance, restyled with sculpted surfaces and 3-D effect added to the seven-slot grille. The once separate foglamp housing is now integrated into a single opening in the front bumper.

The black-based S-Limited test car was accented with metallic grey finishes on roof, exterior badging and new Granite Crystal multi-spoke 19-inch alloy wheels. Termed Neutral Grey by the maker, blink and you'll miss them. Neutral, indeed.

#### Interior

Jeep's genuine go-anywhere mid-range off-roaders, not generally known for their stylish, premium craftsman-like cabin interiors, have taken a turn for the better with the new Compass S-Limited.

Many elements of the cabin have been updated with special attention being given to the dashboard, centre console and door panels, all featuring quality materials.

Added to this in the test vehicle were black headliner and grey accent stitching in keeping with the striking exterior. The controls are integrated and easy to reach, as is the touchscreen, which has been elevated to the top of the dash.

Storage has been expanded, with 5 litres of space situated under the centre armrest. There's an extra 2.4 litres next to the gearshift able to take a small tablet or the like.

The boot chips in with a massive 438 litres of luggage space. Access is via a new automatic tailgate, which can be opened by making a kicking motion under the bumper. Options intended to spoil the new owner include dual pane panoramic sun roof, ventilated and heated front seats, plus heated steering wheel and surround-view 360-degree camera.

#### Infotainment

The new Compass makes use of the new-generation Jeep Uconnect 5 system, based on a 10.1-inch digital touchscreen with access to music, apps, seat position, mirror angles and climate comfort levels, and frequent destinations, plus a 'Valet' mode.

Wireless integration comes via Apple CarPlay and Android Auto, customisable one-touch operation home page, TomTom navigation with voice recognition and Alpine nine-speaker Premium audio. A new Ultra HD 10.25-inch instrument

cluster is standard on Limited, S-Limited and Trailhawk.

#### **Engines / Transmissions**

The new Compass S-Limited relies on Jeep's tried and tested 2.4-litre Tigershark petrol engine, mated with a new nine-speed automatic transmission and Jeep Active Drive 4x4 and Selec-Terrain off-road systems.

#### Safety

Advanced Driver Assistance Systems, standard on new Compass includes traffic sign recognition, intelligent speed assist, drowsy driver alert and automatic emergency braking with pedestrian and cyclist recognition.

Forward collision warning, lane sense departure warning, electronic stability control with electronic roll mitigation, plus front, side and curtain airbags are carried over from the previous generation.

#### Driving

The Compass S-Limited 2.4-litre four-cylinder petrol engine went about a not-too-demanding workload with up to five occupants, plus their gear without much fuss.

Given a bit of a push off the mark, however, the odd gearshift was jerky but once up to cruising speed, the vehicle handled the bitumen and sections of gravel road with alacrity through efficient power delivery. Steering was on the stiff side, even on smooth bitumen.





As for fuel consumption, Jeep claims a combined urban / highway consumption of 9.7 litres per 100 kilometres. The test S-Limited recorded 10 litres per 100 kilometres across a range of driving conditions.

At night the front lighting shone in more ways than one, the LED lamps twice as bright as the previous Xenons, with greater depth of field and wider beam.

The seats were a trifle unwelcoming, being flat, firm and lacking lateral support, which

could be a problem in rough going off road. Head and shoulder space were more-than ample for average-size occupants.

#### Summary

Jeep has realised it cannot rely on the company's raw off-road credentials to match the sophistication of the modern compact SUV. The Compass is heading in the right direction to take up the battle against some of the most competitive rivals on the planet. Good luck.

Despite constant lockdowns and fewer games, the Burras landed second on the ladder for the 2021 season.


The Burras have also announced a number of re-signings.
